Beginning in the 1980s, the League began establishing self-funded insurance pools to help members and other local government entities meet their insurance needs. On February 28, 2020 the Supreme Court of North Carolina ruled in favor of the Town of Oak Island allowing the town to continue collecting certain sewer fees allowed under a local act. This decision marks another success in the League's long-standing amicus program in which the League performs direct judicial advocacy by filing "friend of the court" briefs in support of the municipal position in a
